Wonderful water



Bringing water into your garden can be very beneficial for all wildlife from birds and hedgehogs to frogs and insects. Ponds can be very rewarding for us too; the sound of

running water is relaxing and you'll get a lot of enjoyment watching the wildlife in and around your new water feature. Depending on the size of your garden, your budget and requirements a pond can be as large or small as you like no matter the size rest assured it will bring a great deal to your garden.

Wildlife puddle

What you'll need

Water-tight container, gravel and rocks, pond plants.

How to do it

- 1. Choose a suitable container, this could be anything from a washing up bowl to a preformed pond
- 2. Place the container where you would like your pond to go, some points to consider are:
 - It needs to be in a safe location so it doesn't get disturbed or fallen into (remember safety - if you have small children, it needs to be out of their reach and they will need to be supervised in the garden)
 - It needs to be in a bright spot but not direct sunlight all day
 - If it is being sunken into the ground leave space around it for rocks, plants etc.
 a pond level with the ground is best for wildlife

- 3. Put a layer of gravel in the bottom of the pond and use rocks and logs to produce a slope at one side this will allow wildlife to enter and get back out safely
- 4. Fill your pond with water (ideally rainwater) and add some water plants these will provide the wildlife with somewhere to hide and lay eggs.
- 5. Plant around the pond to make it fit in with the garden
- 6. Wait—over time your pond plants will grow, the water will settle and wildlife will turn up. Enjoy!
